We are all responsible for keeping young people safe. All students should feel comfortable to speak with a teacher or staff member they trust if they feel unsafe or if they need help. There are 11 National Principles for Child Safe Organisations. These are:



01

CLC welcomes Australia's First Nations people and respects and values their culture.

04

Families and communities know about and are involved in CLC's child and safety and wellbeing activities.

07

Young people, families, staff and volunteers at CLC are listened to and can share problems and concerns.

10

CLC keeps reviewing and improving its child safety and wellbeing practices.

02

All people at CLC care about young people's safety and wellbeing, and make sure they act that way.

05

Every member of the CLC community is treated with dignity, respect and fairness.

08

Staff and volunteers at CLC keep learning all the time, so they know how to keep young people safe and well.

11

CLC writes down how it keeps young people safe and well, and makes sure that everyone can see it. 03

Young people at CLC are told about their human rights, have a say in decisions and are taken seriously. Students can speak up if they feel unsafe.

06

People working with young people at CLC are suitable and are taught how to keep children safe and well.

09

Young people at CLC are safe in online and physical spaces.
